2. Integrity of Creation 2-'Ecology'

Moreover they should respect all creatures, animate and inanimate, which 'bear the imprint of the Most High' and should strive to move from the temptation of exploiting creation to the Franciscan concept of universal kinship. Rule 18

Following the example of St Francis, patron of ecologists, they should actively put forward initiatives that care for creation and should work with others in efforts that both put a stop to polluting and degrading nature and also establish circumstances of living and environment which would not be a threat to the human person. Constitutions art 18.4



Those responsible for business enterprises are responsible to society for the economic and ecological effects of their operations. 'Equally worrying is the ecological question which accompanies the problem of consumerism and which is closely connected with it. In his desire to have and to enjoy rather than to be and to grow, man consumes the resources of the earth and his own life in an excessive and disordered way. At the root of the senseless destruction of the natural environment lies an anthropological error, which unfortunately is widespread in our day...man thinks that he can make arbitrary use of the earth, subjecting it without restraint to his will, as though it did not have...a prior God-given purpose...' [John Paul II Centesimus Annus 37] They have an obligation to consider the good of persons and not only the increase of profits. They make possible the investments that ensure the future of a business and they guarantee employment. [Catechism of the Catholic Church 2432 (p 520)]



"Praise & Ecology" St Francis not only acknowledged God as creator, but experienced the presence of the divine love at the heart of the created order. He was not a pantheist and did not worship nature, but he discerned the vitality and glory of God in and through the natural world. Francis' genius was that he recognised and communed with the tenderness of God in nature's beauty and vulnerability.

One day, travelling through the Spoleto valley he came across a great host of various kinds of birds. Leaving his companions, he ran towards them and greeted them with great joy, and they stayed, waiting expectantly. He was deeply moved and preached them a homily:

'My brothers and sisters, you should praise your creator very much, and always love him; he gave you feathers to clothe you and wings so that you can fly...God made you noble among his creatures, and he gave you a home in the purity of the air; though you neither sow nor reap, he nevertheless protects and governs you without any solicitude on your part.'

At this they stretched their necks, extended their wings, opened their mouths and gazed at him. Francis passed among them gently, touching them with his habit, and then he made the sign of the cross over them, blessed them, and gave them leave to fly away...

Brother Francis is the worthy patron saint of ecology for our day.
